A Pastoral Letter from Ray Bagnuolo Published in eChimes, December 8, 2021

Dear Friends,

It's not the same as it was...we've never been here before. We have never been in the Advent of Christmas after our "normal" lives came screeching to a halt twenty-two months ago. It is as though we are recovering from major surgery on a scale like nothing in our lifetimes, and the healing is not happening fast enough. I will not belabor the statistics of this virus. They are impossible to grasp - but that doesn't mean we have not been impacted deeply by it all. There has been no escape, even as we emerge from its unfolding. Each step forward brings with it equal parts hope and concern. Hope that we are coming to an end of the neverending variations of viruses, and concerns that we are still at risk. So we are careful and smart and cautious and increasingly vaccinated. And as we go, in many ways, we have forgotten how to be with each other. As we begin to gather, we do so with a degree of trepidation. We have been in a "defensive" mode in many ways. Twenty-two months and counting is a long time "away from"; long enough to forget what we have forgotten and not realize what has crept in, even as we gratefully move in the direction of one another and congregational life. No, there has never been a time quite like this - on top of everything else. On top of our daily lives. And we need to remember...

As from the very beginning of the pandemic, my number one concern is for the safety of everyone in the congregation; the second is to imagine, create, and learn ways in which we can meaningfully stay connected. From hosting daily drop-in calls on Zoom March through August 2019; learning technologies many of us never knew existed; to making sure those who needed food or medicine or to get to doctors got what they needed; we cared for one another in all the ways we could - and we still do. We have been through a lot. And yet, here we remain. And many are not as fortunate as we.

I know you know this; I just want you to know that <u>I know</u> this "time" has been hard on each of you. This has been a doozy of a time, And I want to take this moment as we renew "in-person congregational life": celebrating the lives of *Karl* and *Don*; planning for the return of our public ministries like the Victorian Tea; opening our doors to the community in calling out the Joy of this season with the return of our Christmas Concert; and doing our Emmanuel-best! to renew the deepest meaning of Advent and Christmas, while limited still in many ways...I want to thank you all for your forbearance, commitment and courage during this time.

It's not easy, I know. None of this is easy, and it is not our fault or our mistakes that have brought us to his place. It's just where we are and ours to do what needs to be done. And it can be tricky....simple conversations come out wrong; sensitivity and defensive meters can get a bit high; feeling tired now and then is not totally under our control considering the daily near-assault of media and misinformation and how it can wear us out: another high school shooting, court decisions, women' rights challenges, immigration, vaccine equity, cowardly political behaviors - and none of this is as important as the person next to you. Then we go from there. You, all of you and your families, are the persons next to me. That's where I start and then I go from there - with you. And, I always need your help.

Which is why I trust in God, our love for one another, and you. And, that gives me Joy to say.

We have been gradually and ever so-slowly working our way back in person. Since August 30th of 2020, we have held in-person worship, while continuing online worship (which began in 2018). We are not yet breaking bread as we wish, not moving around, greeting, singing, or meeting in the Vestry after worship - but we will - and we are heading there. And, thank you for being with us, however you are able. And thank you for your honest feedback, even when it is hard to hear. It's ok. Easy, too often, is overrated, anyway.:)

Yes, God is doing something new - and I don't know what it is. I just know that our being together in the middle of Advent 2021 is something none of us were sure would happen a year ago - after it had always happened before. And for that, for you, for your patience and love - we are all blessed together.

This is our time...what we do with it is ours to say. What we do together will always be stronger and more helpful for a world that needs us now more than ever, even as we figure out what that means.

How far is it to Bethlehem? Not sure, but I think it is inching closer, as long as we stay close.

Perhaps there is something here you wish to share with someone you might be thinking of calling. If not, just saying "Hi" is enough. Especially now...
