Words matter.

In the beginning of John, the Evangelist makes it clear how one Word in particular matters: From John 1:1

In the Beginning there was the Word; the Word was in God's presence, and the Word was God. The Word was present to God from the beginning.

Through the Word all things came into being, and apart from the Word nothing came into being that has come into being.

And the Word was life, and that life was humanity's light—a Light that shines in the darkness, a Light that the darkness has never overtaken.

Perhaps some of the most powerful words ever written. For a moment, let's set aside that John was writing decades after Jesus' execution at the hands of a torture created by the Persians in 300 – 400 BCE: crucifixion - a word that that is at the root of our own word: "excruciating" – a slow, painful suffering.

For a moment, let's also set aside that the purpose of John's gospel is to affirm in the most powerful of ways that Jesus Christ is Divine, the Messiah, the Beloved One of God. This especially made clear towards the end of Chapter 3, following this morning's reading in John 3:16:

Click

Yes, God so loved the world As to give the only Begotten One That whoever believes in Jesus may not die, But have eternal life.

From the earliest of John's words to here and beyond, John has one purpose. To prove Jesus' Divinity.

For a moment, knowing these things about John, let's return to the first few verses and the Word. The presence. The word that excites all things into being. The Word that is light, shines in the darkness and brings life to all humanity. That "Word" has no word in our language or abilities to explain, let alone wrap our minds in. It is though, within us, it is what we have been created from and given to share. It is a reflection of who we are in the presence of God – not as standing before in judgment as is so often used for behavior modification – but in the shekinah – the glittering presence of God – in which we reside, from which we go into our lives and into the world around us: that, is the Word in us.

It is that presence of God in us. The Word in us that that changes the world because it changes our direction back to God from which it came, long before 1st Century in the Common Era. It is the Abba that Jesus speaks of in his time; the Divine that John presents in Jesus.

Last night we were truly blessed with a performance by these Chamber Singers and their Leader Marc Foster. Long before they appeared here last night they felt a "word" a "nudge" a "light" that moved them. Every choice, practice session, the encouragement of those who teach and lead, challenges, long nights in college, life opening up with choices and decision – families, friends, determination and doubts – was an unfolding of what the Word: sing means to them.

Sing. Sometimes referred to as a "spell" so powerful in how it moves others. Voices and accompaniments and words that yes, as Dr. Marc said last night, moves us into the light that knows the shadows, as well.

And so, when Nicodemus came to Jesus out of those dark shadows; Nicodemus who only appears in John's Gospel; he was seeking... more... of the Word he knew, the more evidenced in Jesus by the things Nicky (as his friends called him) was able to do.

He might have said to Jesus, "How do you sing like that?"

And Jesus might have said to him, "Nicodemus, how will you sing the Word in you to change the world? That is up to you..."

In times like we are in, our times, like others before, it is the same question: How will be sing the Word of Love and Life given to us from before eternity, from "above" us – so far beyond us – that it has to be above – for there is not enough room here for such a beginning.

How will we sing to our warring peoples; the hard-hearted heartless leaders who follow only a word of their own: power.

How will we sing to those bringing life into the world, beginning families, caring for elders, tending to the sick, comforting those in loss.

How will we sing to the rising sun on Easter morn, that is – Every morn, with the wonder and inspiration that only a deep expression of creation-in-us, God-with-us, echoes when such beauty reminds us of how beautiful each of us are.

How will we sing to stop those who are determined to use the teachings and texts as implements of their own desire to marginalize and legislate the rights of women, voters, trans kin of ours, queer people who bring a very special song to the world; a song God has called us to sing.

How? Indeed.

In 1966 I saw the original off-Broadway production of The Man of La Mancha with Richard Kiley on the experimental thrust-stage (theater in the round) at the Anta Washington Square theater in Greenwich Village. I was 15. It was my first play. A high school Spanish trip. I was spellbound from the moment I took my seat, taken into another dimension as the ceiling opened and the stage entered into the dungeon, the cell where Cervantes and his fellow cellmates performed the story as they awaited their fate during the Spanish Inquisition.

It was from that moment on for me (and for many others who saw one or more of the 2,328 Tony Award performances) it was an assurance that there was a world out there looking for the dream, the Word of Life and Love; the proof that goodness would bring us to one another and for many – their senses.

It was an affirmation that no matter what, we keep on singing. And when it comes to others and how we care for others as a reflection of how we are cared for and loved from the beginning that, yes, in our own quiet or not so quiet ways (both are needed):

That we are willing to march into hell for a heavenly cause. And to know, if we can only be true to this glorious quest... That the world will be (as it continues to be) better for this.

So, I say this to myself, to you, if you wish to hear:

Let no one tell you otherwise... Let no one tell anyone otherwise...

You are loved and beautiful and here to be who you are, love who you love, vote for whom you wish, express yourself in all your glory, be safe from violence on the streets and in the public space; receive the care you need; take have your rights as a woman; live fully and wide as a trans person; dress in drag if you wish...

And in all the ways you are able keep on singing.

For, in the beginning, the Word, perhaps better said – was really a song, just begun.

And so, when Jesus gathered with his own song, and brought the disciples and friends he loved together at the table, for the last time; a meal that would have occurred all during his ministry; this one, though, with the troops coming closer each day, he sand to them as he always did, perhaps with a bit more urgency:

Friends, remember how I love you. Oh, how I have and will continue to love you. Remember what we have done, how we have brought heart and words and promise to those who had no voice, were infirm, lost, forgotten – and remember we did these things because we are loved by Abba, by God, and so we love God with all our heart and all our soul and all our might and we love one another as ourselves... never held hostage to others who refuse what we have to say – but always open to the day they may...

And I am sure he said something like, remember me how I love you, what I taught you, that I am always with you as God is always with you as the ruach is always with you and the best way to remember to remember is when you sit and break bread, and remember that it is in the breaking of bread and out old and hard ways that we have more to give, that the light shines through, and as you drink... remember that it is in our veins as this drink is in our bodies a covenant that brings us to this world ... with words from long before we knew them to the many who are starving and thirsting to hear you.

Do these things, remember me, and now, enough talk... eat!
