


Second Sunday after Pentecost

Sayville Congregational United Church of Christ June 12, 2022







n March 2020, our lives and how we gathered (or not) were forever changed by COVID restictions. Once we knew we needed to suspend worship together in our sanctuary, along with all the other ways in which we came together – we quickly shifted to an intense time of ZOOM-learning. Daily check-ins for months, bible jam, board meetings, committee meetings, worship and more – all to the Internet.

Inirtially to keep worship vibrant, we edited our archives of live-streamed services and assembled weekly 1 hour 10 AM video services every Sunday. Sean provided pre-recorded music and sermons were recorded from backyards to Calverton Memorial Cemetery (for Memorial Day worship).

Eventually the choir began rehearing over Zoom, anthems were practiced and recorded. Final tracks of the choir and the accompaniment were assembled and edited by Sean for some of the most beautiful and uplifting music created anywhere – especially for such a time.

When it became safe to do so, we began recording our liturgists over Zoom from their homes and then editing it all together with the other elemesnts of worship. Before too long, we began recording liturgists and the choir in the sanctuary, moving always closer to our return, all while our Sanctuary Return Committee carefully and lovingly guided us back.

And, our first Sunday "back" arrived on August 30, 2020 – 23 weeks from the time we stepped away from in-person worship. We were among the first houses of worship to carefully and cautiously "return".

In the weeks that followed, we missed only three Sundays in the Sanctuary, returning to online worship: once because of weather and twice for safety from potential contact with the virus on a previous Sunday.

Through it all – we never missed a Sunday worship time together, including special observations such as Ash Wednesday, Lent, Holy Week and even an Easter Sunrise service of sorts! And we have grown healthier and stronger ever since.

During our PRIDE month that year on Sunday, June 28, 2020, we recorded different leaders and speakers, all of whom you can watch and listen on our website. This morning, with Patricia Mahar's persmission, we will replay Patricia as liturgist and the Call to Worship on that day, filmed in her beuatiful and sacred graden. Please follow along with the prayer that you can read in that section of today's bulletin.

And *then* -- something else happened. We offer part of Patricia's "coming out" story that was unplanned and surely a moment the Spirit had long-planned for our friend.

The following is provided to help you follow along or to revisit at a later time...

So happy that I've been asked to do this on Pride Sunday...because coming out has been a big job for me. A real big, big step forward in creating a freeness about me that I didn't have before. I knew people in church knew that I was gay, but I never said the words, "I am gay" and never really discussed it with my family. So today is kind of special for me. I'm happy to do this and it took me a very long time. Too long.

But when I think of where I came from in the 50's, to here we are in the 20's. What a difference it is - that people have to know - younger people who are coming out, really have to know how difficult really difficult it has been for many of us who were born or lived during the time of the 50s 60s and 70s. And I just wish them courage. And love and love from their families and just live their life and love for other people.

And I think that's all I have to say right now.

[Well, not quite... ☺)

It's true. It too me so long. But my partner Mabel, she was out there left and right and I used to get so embarrassed. We'd be walking down the street and she'd want to hold my hand or my arm and it was like, "Leave me alone!"

I was so worried about losing my job. Because this was in the 70's coming from 60's into the 70's and 80's. And all that time that's all I could think of: If I lose my job, what am I going to do and what's going to happen?

So that was a big fear. And a big threat in my life [and] was why I couldn't come forward and be who I was. And she [Mabel] taught me a lot.

I'll never forget the time we had...I'd been here for a while, we've been here for a while in the neighborhood. I don't know whether the neighbor up the block came in to say "Hi, hello. How are you?" And Mabel being as she was says, "Well, I just want you to know that I'm gay!" And I'm like, "Do you have to -- I don't even know this woman. And you're coming out and telling her that you're gay!" Well, we had a row after that.

I said "Why did you do that? She doesn't know us we don't know her. Where's it all gonna go?"

She's "Don't worry about it. Just be who you are."

And took me a long time to be who I am. But that really, that threw me for a curve. But I'm very grateful to be in this church because the open and affirming was a wonderful thing.

So, I'm saying to myself, "Self, this is the time to really talk about it. I don't think there'll be any negativity there at all. But it's just the fear. I just have to lose that. And it's dissipating little by little it's taking me baby steps to take giant steps."


