Gospel Reading: John 21:12-19 (from The Inclusive Bible)

"Come and eat your meal," Jesus told them. None of the disciples dared to ask, "Who are you?" – They knew it was the savior.

Jesus came over, took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This marked the third time that Jesus had appeared to the disciples after being raised from the dead.

When they had eaten their meal, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon ben-John, do you love me more than these?" Peter said, "Yes, Rabbi, you know that I'm your friend." Jesus said, "Feed my lambs."

A second time Jesus put the question, "Simon ben-John, do you love me?"

A third time Jesus asked him, "Simon ben-John, do you love me as a friend would?"

Holy Communion

The Invitation

God calls us to forgive, to build peace, and to share loving fellowship. Everyone may come to the table of reconciliation – which means all persons – all ages, cultures, sexual identities, abilities, religions, and diversities – those who affirm their elemental worth, and those who are yet to do so.

So come to this table, then, as you are.

Partake and share. It is spread for you and for me that we might again know that God has come to us, shared our common lot, and invited us to join the people of God's new age.

The Purpose

Long ago, God sought to commune with us, and by choosing to live with us embodied as Jesus, God experienced all the desires and temptations that we face in our daily living as human beings.

Jesus, then, first showed us how to restrain those human desires and temptations; and in calling his disciples and followers, he revealed how to spread his way of love and peace in our wide and wonderful community here on Earth.

Presenting the Elements

By sharing the cup of blessing, we become the new life of Christ in the world. What we symbolize here in this holy space, we justify by our service when we go forth from this place.

Holy Mystery, bless this bread and this cup, the wheat and the grape, the farmer and the harvest, the seed and the sower.

So that in the sharing of these simple elements in community, we may taste and see your goodness, and catch a glimpse of what it is to be in communion with you and with one another.
